Dear Minister Smitherman:

At its June 29, 2006, the Middlesex-London Board of Health considered **Report No. 099-06 re Key Findings Released from the North American Conference on UV, Vitamin D and Health** and passed the following resolution:

That the provincial government be petitioned to pass legislation requesting the use of artificial tanning equipment in a manner consistent with the World Health Organization (WHO) recommended criteria which include:

- Restrict age of access/use to greater than 18 years of age,
- Require client consent forms for all operations,
- Post specific warning notices in the salon as well as on all equipment,
- Post maximum exposure times,
- Establish and monitor a minimum interval between consecutive exposures (via detailed client records),
- Restrict any clients with a fair skin (type 1) from access, based on Client Consent Form data.
- Require compulsory eyewear for all users,
- Require mandatory annual training for operators and staff,
- Prohibit the advertising of health benefit claims,
- Prohibit sale/use of tanning accelerator products,
- Maintain sanitary conditions and infection control of equipment and facilities, and
- Ban all freestanding equipment, allowing only operator-controlled equipment.
