Most local health workers don't get flu shot

Ontario's public health agency is calling for the flu shot to be mandatory for all health-care workers in the province, urging it to be a condition of employment in hospitals, nursing homes, home care or in any kind of community setting.

Public Health Ontario changed its best practice guidelines last week because voluntary use of the annual influenza vaccine has not been as high as the agency would like. The average vaccination rate for health-care workers in the province is stuck below 60 per cent.

At Sarnia-Lambton hospitals, 45% of staff received a shot last flu season, up from a 37% to 40% vaccination rate the previous four years. The exception was 2009 when 58% rolled up their sleeves for the H1N1 vaccine, and 13% got the seasonal vaccine.

Frontline health-care workers across Ontario — and especially in Toronto — are endangering their patients by neglecting to obtain a flu shot. If anyone should know better, it's these people. And their failure is inexcusable.





Goals

2012

- In 2011, our goal was 80% in all homes across
 Canada. In Ontario, 42 homes reached this goal
- For that reason we created a <u>NEW</u> goal

What did we do differently?

We collected the <u>actual</u> number of staff immunized (as per the adjacent chart) and allowed for some exemptions**

- Allergies
- Pregnancy
- Religious reasons
- Casual with less than 3 shifts

Education and Corporate Support
