



Infection Control for Diabetes Blood Glucose Monitoring Procedures in Long-Term Care Homes

Failure to follow proper infection control procedures during glucose monitoring can put residents at risk for transmission of hepatitis B virus and other bloodborne pathogens.

General Infection Control.

- □ Trays or carts used to deliver medications or supplies should remain outside resident rooms. Do not carry supplies and medications in pockets.
- Maintain supplies and equipment such as fingerstick devices and glucometers within individual resident rooms if possible.
- Unused supplies and medications taken to a resident's bedside should not be used for another resident.

Fingerstick capillary blood sampling devices must <u>never</u> be shared between residents.

- □ The lancets used in these devices must not be re-used.
- Restrict use of fingerstick capillary blood sampling devices to individual patients. Consider selecting single-use lancets that permanently retract upon puncture.
- Dispose of used lancets and disposable fingerstick devices at the point of use in an approved sharps container.

Each resident should have his/her own glucometer.

If the glucometer is used for different residents, it must be disinfected with a low-level disinfectant after each use as per the Provincial Infectious Diseases Advisory Committee (PIDAC) Best Practices for Cleaning, Disinfection and Sterilization of Medical Equipment/Devices in All Health Care Settings.

The health care worker must ensure proper hand hygiene practices during glucose monitoring:

- □ Wear gloves during procedure.
- Change gloves between patients and after performing fingerstick blood sampling.
- Perform hand hygiene (handwashing with soap and water or the use of alcohol-based hand rub) immediately after removal of gloves and before touching supplies to be used on other residents.
